Policy & Advocacy

Upcoming core partner educational policy/advocacy days

In 2016, the NMHEP team will be working in partnership with four core partners to coordinate and host educational policy/advocacy days. Core community-based partners, located in Bernalillo, Doña Ana, McKinley and San Miguel counties, are working to improve health by addressing economic justice, environmental justice, land-use policies, and substance abuse treatment rather than incarceration. Previous policy/advocacy days have focused on the health impacts of uranium mining; educating how the Santolina Master Development would affect land, water, and health; civic engagement in Doña Ana county; and the Safe Passage Initiative, Complete Streets, and Predatory Lending in San Juan County.

Please keep an eye out for 2016 policy/advocacy days! NMHEP network members will be invited to attend policy/advocacy days to serve as a bigger base of support.

Sharing Our Looking Within: A Health Impact Assessment on Uranium Mining with Community Members

Over the last few months, Jordon Johnson, PhD- Executive Director, New Mexico Equity and Social Justice Institute has been presenting to Iyanbito, Church Rock, Standing Rock, Manuelito, and Tsayatoh Chapters on the Health Impact Assessment (HIA) conducted about the uranium legacy in McKinley county. Copies of the report have been shared with community members at these presentations. This has often led to rich conversations and personal stories being shared by community members about this history and the health issues people are encountering. In reflecting on the conversations from the presentations, the team has recognized a need to pursue more health studies, as well as address the lack of compensation for former workers who are dealing with the health impacts identified in the report.

Jordon also presented to the Navajo Nation Health and Education Committee which peaked interest in potentially pursuing an HIA in other parts of the Navajo Nation facing similar circumstances as the Red Water Pond Community. The team will be exploring how to share this report and process with other community members in the area.


Future presentations include Coyote Canyon and Pinedale Chapters as well as a presentation for students, faculty and community members at the University of New Mexico-Gallup.

Action-Oriented Small Group Gathering

The Somos Unidos para los Niños (SUN) Project Begins to Shine in New Mexico

With support from the New Mexico Health Equity Partnership, members of The SUN Project's core committee met in Socorro New Mexico on Tuesday, March 1, 2016 to deepen relationships and begin mapping out an action plan for the next two to three years. In answering New Mexico's call to transform public education in the state, the overarching goal of The SUN Project is to create a public education framework in New Mexico that is responsive to diverse learners across the state. The hope is that the framework will inform the development of a long-range plan for education in New Mexico that will guide the trajectory of existing and future preK-12 education policies.

The core committee members started with an extensive literature review coupled with two decades of community input that harnessed local and national expertise from parents, youth, teachers, school administrators, researchers, policy analysts, and other stakeholders. A draft framework resulted. The committee is now preparing to launch a statewide civic engagement initiative to reclaim education for New Mexicans by New Mexicans.

Four key questions are driving this effort:

- What is the purpose of public education in New Mexico?
- How is educational success defined?
- · How is educational success measured?
- What is the purpose of evaluation in education?

The premises that underlie this effort are:

- 1) an excellent education system needs appropriate and adequate support and resources on the front end of service delivery;
- 2) accountability encompasses much more than teachers and administrators thus parents, state departments of education, higher education institutions, preK-12 educators, and the federal government have a critical role to play;
- 3) expectations must be higher for all the individuals and entities involved in education that are inclusive and holistic;
- 4) the purpose of evaluation is to support continuous curricular, teaching, and student learning improvement in proactive, constructive, and inclusive ways where fair and relevant metrics must include classroom, school, district, and state level inputs and outcomes.


